Update from the Executive Director





It's been a beautiful spring in central Alberta and the quick start to the year with the rush of the AGM, organizational meetings, committee formation is starting to shift to regular operations and execution on our annual workplan. I marked my second year with Alberta Chicken Producers (ACP) at the end of February and feel very fortunate to be working alongside a talented and hard-working Board and Staff who are proud to represent the Alberta chicken sector.

The start of 2025 has been one of uncertainty, driven by a charged political environment both at home and abroad. The threat of U.S. tariffs has been a major focus over the last couple of months, and while our sector is not impacted as directly by these threats as commodity groups reliant on export to the U.S., there are many indirect consequences that affect domestic chicken production. ACP has been active in working alongside Chicken Farmers of Canada in providing feedback to the federal government on U.S. imports that are critical to chicken production as they refine their retaliatory tariff list.

Government relations have been a major focus throughout this time. Our Alberta government has been quite vocal in the face of U.S. tariff threats, and our efforts in establishing a good working relationship with our Ministry have served us well, particularly when the topic of supply management is raised. We appreciated the greetings shared by Agriculture Minister RJ Sigurdson to kick off this year's AGM, where he expressed his commitment to support our farmers and our market.

With supply management getting more press in recent months, there has been increased communication and collaboration with the Alberta SM5 (chicken, hatching egg, turkey, table egg and dairy) to ensure we are part of the conversation with our elected officials. The SM5 was honoured to secure a meeting with Premier Danielle Smith, along with Minister RJ Sigurdson, to ensure we are part of the conversation when discussions around supply management arise. We believe the meeting went well and were pleased with the level of engagement and discussion from Premier Smith.

The other area of focus for ACP has been on our supply chain, with a focus on achieving one hundred per cent utilization of our provincial allocation. The national base adjustment for 2025 saw more kilograms shifted to the summer months to meet the demand for fresh chicken during barbeque season. While this represents a great opportunity for Alberta producers, it also creates challenges related to grower space and barn capacity, particularly during the A-196 and A-197 growing periods. We are seeing very positive

indicators that could significantly increase allocations, suggesting it is a good time for Alberta producers to expand chicken-growing capacity to meet increasing market demand.

As you will be aware, the second challenge to Alberta achieving one hundred per cent utilization will involve chick supply. ACP has been very active in working with our value chain partners to address both import and domestic hatching egg supply. U.S. import supply has become very tight, due to HPAI affecting a large U.S. breeder, so ACP is working closely with both Alberta Hatching Egg Producers (AHEP) and our hatcheries in an attempt to increase domestic hatching egg supply. We were pleased to learn earlier this week that AHEP has increased their allocation factor (production factor) from 108% to 112%, effective June 16, which is hoped to eventually put Alberta in a position of lowering breeder flock life and provide additional buffer to our hatching egg supply in the face of tight U.S. imports. Additional measures to encourage more hatching egg supply include Canadian Hatching Egg Producers' decision to increase their overproduction sleeve by 10% for 2025 and 6% for 2026. ACP will remain committed to working with our value chain partners on addressing chick supply going forward to meet the growing demand for chicken.

We have a lot of meaningful work ahead of us in 2025 and are looking forward to an exciting year in the Alberta chicken sector. We feel very fortunate to be a part of a growing sector that looks to provide many opportunities for our producers in the future!

With that, I would like to wish you a wonderful summer and hope to connect with many of you at some point throughout the year.

Annual General Meeting Resolution Results

At our 59th Annual General Meeting, producers voted on the following resolutions.

Resolution #1: Marketing Regulation Changes Vote

"Be it resolved that the membership of the Alberta Chicken Producers approves the proposed changes to the Alberta Chicken Producers Marketing Regulation as presented."

Voting results:

- 97.9% In Favour
- 2.1% Opposed

Resolution #2: HPAI Reimbursement & Emergency Reserve Funding Vote

"Whereas the Alberta Chicken Producers (ACP) have implemented a formal procedure for producer reimbursement of expenses not covered by CFIA compensation, and that existing ACP Financial Policy defines allowable use of the ACP Emergency Reserve Fund, be it resolved that the membership of the Alberta Chicken Producers approve an increased cap for our Emergency Reserve Fund (ERF) of \$3 million dollars plus one month of operating expenses, and implements a \$0.0015/kg increase in ACP service charge which will be added to the Alberta minimum live price, until such time that the ERF equals \$3 million dollars, at which time the \$0.0015/kg levy will be discontinued."

Canadian Chicken Farmers Support Government Commitment to Address Spent Fowl Fraud

OTTAWA – Chicken Farmers of Canada (CFC) is encouraged by the recent statement from the Government of Canada, demonstrating a strong commitment to tackling the fraudulent importation of broiler meat mislabeled as spent fowl. The dedication to enhancing collaboration between industry and enforcement agencies marks a positive step toward protecting the integrity of Canada's chicken supply and safeguarding the livelihoods of Canadian chicken farmers.

Spent fowl refers to egg-laying hens that are processed for meat at the end of their production cycle. Unlike broiler chicken meat, imports of spent fowl are not subject to the same import controls, allowing unlimited quantities into Canada. Canadian chicken farmers have long advocated for decisive measures to addross this issue, which has resulted in significant economic impacts. At its peak, fraudulent imports of spent fowl cost Canada 1,400 jobs, \$105 million in economic contributions, \$35 million in taxes, and at least 56 million in government revenues annually.

The Government of Canada has expressed its intention to collaborate with industry partners and enforcement agencies, including the Canadian Foed Impaction Agency (CFLA) and the Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA), to develop an action plan aimed at improving literition, enforcing compliance, and leveling the playing field.

CFC expects this commitment will lead to the implementation of DNA testing to distinguish between broker meat and speen fowl meat—me sesartial step to stopping illegal imports. Research fundle DC Dickien Farmers of Canada, in collobartion with Treut University, has already developed a reliable DNA test to accurately differentiate between the two types of most.

Chicken Farmers of Canada Sets Allocation for A-196

On February 5, 2025, Chicken Farmers of Canada set the allocation for Period A-196.

The national allocation for Period A-196 was set at 2.0% over adjusted base.

Under the national allocation formula, which defaults to Pro-Rata if there is no growth, Alberta's A-196 allocation is 2.69% over adjusted base.

Alberta's allocation for A-196 will run from June 1, 2025, to July 26, 2025.
